*Share the Gifts*

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread. If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant. The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. **If you wish to dip bread in the wine, extend one hand for a wafer.** Both wine and unfermented grape juice are served, grape juice is administered from the pottery chalice. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request in the East alcove.



*Prayer and Laying-on of Hands for Healing*

We invite those wishing particular prayer for themselves or on behalf of someone else, or to share in a prayer of thanksgiving for blessings received, to come to the front of the line to receive the bread and wine. Immediately after receiving, go to the prayer station. Give your first name and in a low voice briefly state your prayer need. The prayer team will lay hands gently on your shoulders and after a short silence, they will pray quietly for you.

*While the communion is being administered, we respectfully ask that you keep the silence — this is a time for quiet prayer and meditation.*

*Is criticism of Israel anti-semitic?*

The Israeli-Palestinian conflict has been going on now since 1948, when 750,000 Palestinians were forced from their homes into exile in the camps where many of them still live. The behavior of the Israeli government toward them has recently become increasingly brutal, as evidenced in the assault on Gaza in 2008-09, and the assault on the flotilla some months ago.

Some Canadians (Jews and others) say that criti-

cism of the Israeli government is anti-semitic, anti-semitism masked as political comment. Is this necessarily so? And in any event, why should we as Canadians and Christians care?

Don Grayston is a parishioner of the cathedral and a priest of the diocese. He taught Religious Studies at SFU for 15 years. Since 2008 he has been chair of the planning team of Building Bridges Vancouver, a public education program which showcases the work of people trying to bridge the Israeli-Palestinian divide.

So with Heather's unwavering help, we're about to launch a new website on September 10 (same address: [www.cathedral.vancouver.bc.ca](http://www.cathedral.vancouver.bc.ca)). It's pretty on the eyes, and chock full of resources and information for newcomers and regulars alike. It'll let visitors interact with community-created content in a blog-like fashion and to comment on articles and videos we post online.

It'll also play an important role in Christ Church Cathedral communications. It's important that our website engages people and invites them to transformational change in a friendly way.

Just as exciting, the software behind our website was free, and it's pretty much idiot-proof (which means that we can edit it without asking Heather to do it on her night off!). For those of you who are interested, we invite you to come by Mark Munn's office once the website is live. You'll see that editing a website is now as easy as editing a Word document.

#### FEATURES:

1. *It's free.* Our content management system is by Wordpress, an open-source software available from [wordpress.org](http://wordpress.org). This saved the Cathedral \$15,000 or more in software and development costs. It is also free to edit and manage, saving lots in monthly licensing fees. Free means not only no price tag, but also the freedom to extend or modify the site at any time, in any way. (Wordpress is used by Marcus

Borg, Martha Stewart, The New York Times, CNN, Wired Magazine, and the Prime Minister of the UK.)

2. *Videos and Resources.* You'll soon find videos of sermons on the Christ Church website, so you can share them with friends and family. You'll also find an extensive archive of audio sermon recordings, bulletins and email newsletters there.

3. *Cathedral Calendar.* There will be an easy Calendar widget that will allow visitors to easily see what's coming up at Christ Church - whether it's music, a Christian formation seminar, or just next Sunday's service times.

4. *Interactivity.* The new site work like a blog, and there will be lots of interactive content. If you feel like expressing yourself, now you can!

5. *Photos.* There will be lots and lots of photos for your viewing pleasure.

6. *Plugins and Widgets.* Plugins and widgets are kind of like the gadgets on a swiss-army knife. There are literally thousands of plugins and widgets that extend what a WordPress website can do, so the actual functionality of our website is nearly limitless.

## *National Housing Strategy*

NATIONAL HOUSING STRATEGY - Diocesan Wide Letter Writing Campaign to October 20th 2010

Housing advocates across Canada are rallying behind a House of Commons Private Member's Bill C-304 in hope that a long-awaited national housing strategy will soon become a reality.

Bill C-304, the Secure, Adequate, Accessible & Affordable Housing Act, calls for the Federal Minister responsible for Housing, currently Human Resources & Skills Development Minister Diane Finley, to consult with provincial & territorial housing ministers, as well as with representatives from municipalities, aboriginal communities, non-profit groups & the private sector, to establish a strategy that will ensure that the cost of housing in Canada "does not compromise an individual's ability to meet other basic needs" such as food, clothing & access to education.

In response, the Eco-Justice Unit of the Diocese of New Westminster is promoting a diocesan wide letter writing campaign to October 20th, 2010. For those who have access online, information about this campaign can be found at: <http://www.vancouver.anglican.ca/AboutOurDiocese/ReachingOut/>

The third reading, the last step in the process that would see Bill C-304 enacted as legislation is scheduled for debate sometime this fall. Together, we can work to end homelessness & housing insecurity in Canada.

# Notes from

SEPTEMBER 5, 2010

One of the strange things about having been away for four months is how normal it feels to be back. There's a sense of real life re-asserting its grip as regular routines are picked up again and familiar relationships rediscovered. It certainly doesn't feel as if I haven't been away, as it can do all too soon after a fortnight's holiday, but it takes a certain effort to hold the last four months in mind and to reflect on the gifts that it has brought me.

This can be true for many of us as the summer comes to an end – not just those back from sabbatical. Summer is often a space where our life softens and opens out a little: longer days, greater warmth and light, more time to spend with those we love and doing the things we most enjoy. These are great gifts, great blessings, that make life a delight rather than just a survival routine.

So I'd like to invite you to do the same thing that I'll be doing as the 'fall new year' begins to grip. And that is to reflect back over the highlights of the last few months, and consider what it might be possible to take into this 'new year'. Let this autumn be a season of mellow fruitfulness for you rather than the beginning of a mad dash that lasts through until next summer!

I want to say an especial thank you to all the staff and volunteers at CCC who have taken on extra duties over the summer to cover my time away. In particular my gratitude goes to the cathedral clergy - Peter, Alisdair, Dixie, Patrick, Chris and all the cathedral honoraries - who have presided and preached at more than their usual share of Sunday and weekday Eucharists over the last few months. It gave me wonderful peace of mind on sabbatical knowing that CCC would sail smoothly on in my absence!

Now that I'm back in beautiful Vancouver the family visits are beginning again. My brother, the Rev Jonathan Clark, is coming out on September 13th and has happily agreed to preach at the 10.30 Eucharist on Sunday September 19th. Jonathan is Rector of St Mary's, Stoke Newington, a busy multi-cultural parish in north London, and chair of Affirming Catholicism – the group within the Church of England which campaigns for liberal catholic issues ('liberal catholic' means the same sort of way of being church that we have at the cathedral – Eucharistic, thoughtful, inclusive and engaged both with the traditions of the church and with wider society). I am sure that you will make him very welcome.
