Wheelchair ramp — at the east door on Georgia St., drop-off is possible in the lane.

ASSISTANCE: **ASL interpreter** for the deaf community — communicates the 10:30am service from in front of the ambo. **Loop system** is in place in the nave and chancel, simply adjust the settings of your personal hearing device. **Large-print books and bulletins** — available from greeters prior to the 10:30am service.

KNEELER CUSHIONS: Cushions are available in the Narthex for those who wish to kneel in prayer.

CHILDREN & YOUTH: Activities for children of all ages are available during the 10:30am service.

AFTER THE 10:30AM SERVICE: Coffee and tea are served in the Parish Hall following today's service.

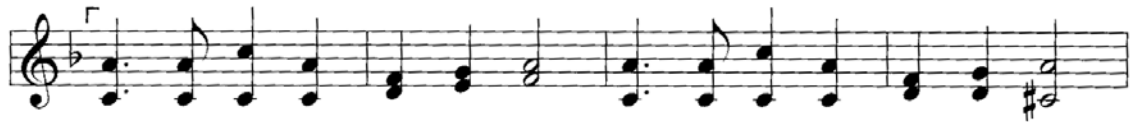

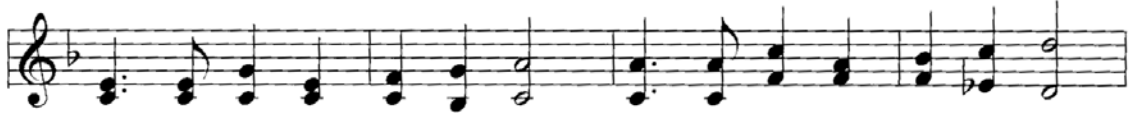

Share the Gifts

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread. If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant. The bread is received in the open palm. The wine may be taken from the common cup, **or if you wish to dip bread in the wine, extend one hand for a wafer.** Both wine and unfermented grape juice are served, grape juice is administered from the pottery chalice. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request in the East alcove.



Prayer and Laying-on of Hands for Healing

We invite those wishing particular prayer for themselves or on behalf of someone else, or to share in a prayer of thanksgiving for blessings received, to come to the front of the line to receive the bread and wine. Immediately after receiving, go to the prayer station. Give your first name and in a low voice briefly state your prayer need. The prayer team will lay hands gently on your shoulders and after a short silence, they will pray quietly for you.

While the communion is being administered, we respectfully ask that you keep the silence — this is a time for quiet prayer and meditation.

Healing Touch at the Cathedral

Healing Touch is an energy-based, heart-centred approach to healing, derived from the multi-cultural ancient art of "hands-on-healing". The goal of healing touch is to restore wholeness and the integration of body, mind and spirit. This is a gentle, safe, non-invasive technique which is intended to complement traditional medicine. At the Cathedral we have a healing touch team of 17 trained practitioners, who are available to serve our parish community by offering healing touch sessions in people's homes, at the hospital, in nursing homes, and after the 10:30 service on the 3rd Sunday of every month. A session can take anywhere from ten minutes to a half hour. Appointments are currently being taken for next week please, after the 10:30 am service. Contact the church office & your name will be passed on to an HT practitioner who will arrange a session with you here at the Cathedral.

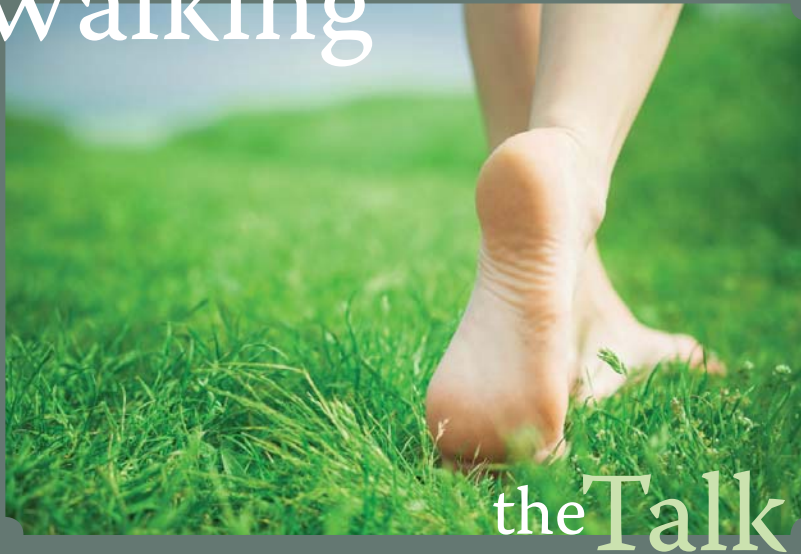

HIV/AIDS Outreach Committee

The Reverend Tsepo Matubatuba and the HIV & AIDS Ministry in Johannesburg, South Africa

The HIV/AIDS Outreach Committee here at Christ Church Cathedral was very grateful when the Reverend Tsepo Matubatuba, the Coordinator: HIV and AIDS Ministry in the Diocese of Johannesburg, agreed to be a liaison with the Soweto Home-Based Caregivers we are helping to support. Although two of our own parish members have visited the caregivers, we were very grateful to have someone on the ground and familiar with the challenges of working with AIDS in the area.

He recently sent us a copy of a fund raising proposal which outlined the work of his project which operates from his office in St. Mary's Cathedral in Johannesburg.

“The Anglican Church of Southern Africa (ACSA) covers seven countries. The Diocese of Johannesburg is mainly urban (including the Johannesburg Metropolis with densely populated townships like Soweto and Alexandra). The rest of the Diocese is in the mining area of the West Rand and Far West. In total the Diocese has more than 75 parishes and sub-parishes and further Church planting is happening in the many informal settlements and Reconstruction and Development Programme (RDP) Housing Settlements. The incidence of HIV and AIDS and TB is very high and continues to increase because of the poverty and inadequate health facilities. Recently the Johannesburg Metropolitan area was declared a TB Crisis Area.”

The ministry is the catalyst for voluntary HIV/AIDS testing and counselling, orphaned and vulnerable child care, home-based care, support groups, nutritional programmes and AIDS related church services. The Diocese pays for the salaries of the coordinator and an administrator as well as office expenses.

Funding comes from the Southern Anglican

Province and, until two years ago, came also from the British government through the organization Christian Aid. With the end of that support, more money is needed to develop sustainable community-based projects aiding those suffering from HIV/AIDS and TB. In particular, Tsepo notes that funding is needed to continue the work of a youth fieldworker as well as to help with the travelling costs for his work within the diocese. Tsepo describes the ministry as ‘injured and ailing’.

All in all, the work he describes sounds very similar to the work of our caregivers in Soweto but on a broader scale. And, like them, his ministry does some of its own fundraising; at this time by organizing what he calls a gala dinner. Donating enough money to pay for one table is 1000 rand or about \$140.00 cd. At our meeting on September 26th, we voted to send that much from our cookie sales at Coffee Hour in thanks for his help to our project.

And a reminder: As the House of Commons Committee on Industry, Science and Technology meets soon to consider changing the rules by which generic anti-retroviral drugs can be shipped to developing countries, read a September 29th article in the journal *Embassy*, in which Richard Elliott, the Executive Director of the Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network refutes the arguments made by the pharmaceutical industry against the changes.

Deacon's Notes

OCTOBER 10, 2010

Thanksgiving and Gratitude.

A few weeks ago I arrived home at 9:15 on a rainy Saturday night after being in a retreat all day. I found my building surrounded by emergency vehicles with lights flashing and men in firefighting gear and hazmat suits moving back and forth between vehicles and the building. Bright lights lit up the night sky and the area all around. So much for the relaxing hot bath and early bed with a good book I had planned. The building had been evacuated late that afternoon as a possible poison hazard!

By 11 pm I found myself in a small hotel room with nothing but the clothes I was wearing, my wallet and phone. Nothing else. When I ventured out to an all night drug store to buy some basic grooming needs, I walked into a sky opened wide, pouring rain down in sheets. There was flash flooding that night. Walking along the street I noticed people huddled in doorways and wherever there was shelter, with little to keep them dry and warm. I thought to myself, "Dixie, just in case you are tempted to feel sorry for yourself, remember, you have a room to sleep in tonight and resources; family and friends and insurance!"

I was out of my home for another five days and during that time there were television news images of the serious flooding and evacuation at Kingcome Inlet and around Bella Coola. The water rose so quickly that the people of Kingcome Inlet had to be evacuated by helicopter; the entire village was emptied in ninety minutes with no serious injury or loss of life. Perspective.

I am very aware that my experience was only an inconvenience, however untimely and unwelcome. The rest of the world around me was still intact and ultimately I had a home I could return to. I can't even imagine the shock and sense of complete displacement that comes from a disaster that alters your whole world.

Recently I came across a story about the famous Muslim mystic and poet, Jalaluddin Rumi and his great poem, the Masnavi. This story is based upon a verse from the Qur'an: "When trouble touches mankind, they call to their Lord, turning in repentance to Him. But when He lets them taste mercy from Himself, some of them start worshipping other gods besides their Lord-- as if to show their ingratitude for the favors we have given them!"

"The story of the vow made by the dog every winter that, 'When next summer comes I will build a house for the winter.' [In this story, the dog symbolizes ingratitude and greed, and the house that is never built is the abode of gratitude.] "In winter the bones of the dog contract together: the blows of the frost make him so small that he says, 'Having such a small body, I must build a stone house. When summer comes, I will use my claws to build a stone house against the cold.' But when summer comes, his bones expand from the relief which he feels, and his skin grows sleek. And when he sees that he is stout, he says, 'In what house will I be able to find room?' He grows stout and slinks into a shady place-- a lazy, full-fed, cowardly, self-opinionated creature. His conscience says to him, 'Build a house!' He replies, 'How shall I find room in the house? Tell me that!' [Rumi then comments:] In the hour of pain, the bones of your greed contract together and you say penitently, 'I will build a house: it will be a refuge for me in winter.' But when the pain is gone and your greed has grown stout, the desire for the house departs from you, just as (for) the dog."

In a not so subtle way Rumi reminds us that it is human nature to forget to be grateful when we are warm and comfortable; it is when we are cold and frightened that we promise to give thanks to God for any favour.

Let us give thanks for all of our blessings and, perhaps, even for some of our trials.
